**History and Purpose of the RCTS Legacy and Reunion Scholarship:** The RCTS Legacy and Reunion Scholarship is designed to support the educational and career aspirations of Randolph County, Alabama students whose family members attended or graduated from RCTS. All funds are allocated annually in scholarships to students with no administrative or other cost. The scholarship is part of a larger effort by RCTS alumni and supporters to preserve and institutionalize the rich RCTS tradition and ensure that its legacy is not lost.



RCTS was a Rosenwald descendant School that served the educational needs of African Americans for 51 years (1919-1970) before public schools in Randolph County, Alabama were desegregated. Since 2005, RCTS scholarships have been awarded to 101 graduating students from Randolph County's four high schools (Handley H.S., Woodland H.S, Wadley H.S., and the Randolph County HS). **Scholarship Eligibility Criteria:** Scholarship applicants must meet the following criteria: (1) a descendant of a family member who attended or graduated from RCTS; (2) a graduating senior enrolled in good academic standing at one of Randolph County's four public high schools; (3) submit an essay addressing the required topic; and (4) indicate a plan to enroll in a two or four-year college or career development training program.

**RCTS Scholarship Essay Topic:** The RCTS Scholarship essay should focus on the following topic: ***Why is voting important to the development and maintenance of our democracy.*** The essay should not exceed two double spaced type-written pages. The essay should be carefully proofread.
